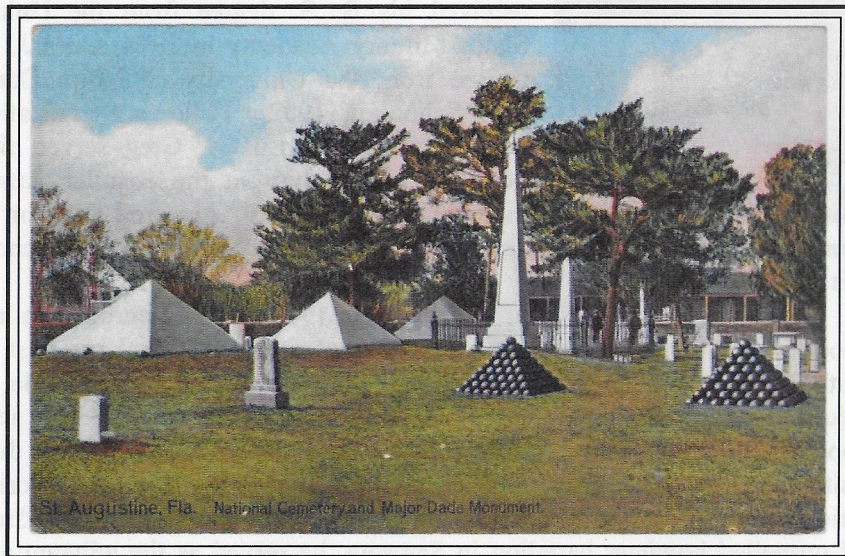

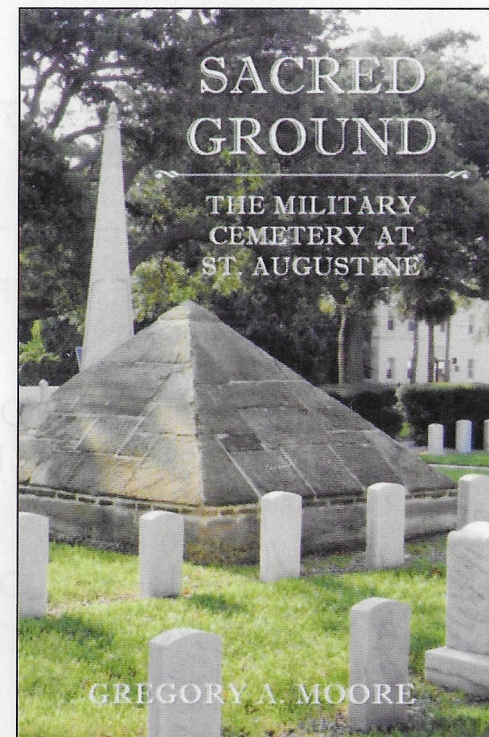

Gregory A. Moore

Gregory A. Moore has served as the Command Historian and Director of Historical Resources for the Department of Military Affairs, Florida National Guard, since June 5, 2001. He received his B. S. degree from the United States Military Academy in 1974 and a J. D. degree from the University of Notre Dame Law School in 1982. Following graduation from West Point in 1974, Greg served five years on active duty in the Regular Army, including a tour with 3rd Armored Division in

Germany and as a gunnery instructor in the U.S. Army Field Artillery School at Ft Sill, Oklahoma.

He joined the U. S. Army Reserve in 1979 when he enrolled in law school. Greg served in a variety of positions as a traditional reservist in South Bend, Indiana and while practicing law in Fort Lauderdale, Florida, to include battalion fire direction officer and commander of an 8-inch self-propelled howitzer battery. In 1986, Greg was selected for an active duty position in the AGR (Active Guard/Reserve) program with the Florida National Guard. In addition to serving as the executive officer of a 155mm self-propelled howitzer battalion in Sarasota, he served as the adjutant and operations officer of a field artillery brigade in Miami and Brandon, as an assistant professor of military science at the Florida State University in Tallahassee and as the Public Affairs Officer for the Florida National Guard at St. Francis Barracks in St. Augustine. He retired from active duty in April of 2001. As the Director of Historical Resources, Greg is responsible for managing the Florida National Guard museum system, as well as the archive collection of the Department of Military Affairs and the Florida National Guard Heritage Art Collection. He also oversees the historical facilities preservation program.

In May of 2005, Greg volunteered for recall from the U.S. Army Retired Reserve to serve a year in Afghanistan as the Public Affairs Officer for 53rd Infantry Brigade (Separate)/Combined Joint Task Force Phoenix IV. As a result of coming under Taliban fire in Kajaki, Helmand Province, Afghanistan in May 2006, he was awarded the Combat Action Badge.

In addition to his research and writing on behalf of the Florida National Guard, Greg commits his personal time to on-going research on the Seminole Indian Wars of Florida, and the impact of U.S. Military Academy graduates on the history of Florida. He has served on the board of directors for the Seminole Wars Foundation, Fort Mose Historical Society, and the St. Augustine Historical Society. He and his wife Nancy live on Anastasia
